John Louis Petit

John Louis Petit (1801-68) was a leading writer and speaker about ecclesiastical architecture, and an extraordinary watercolour artist. His East Midlands paintings have been the subject of a recent exhibition at Rutland County Museum. In his day church architecture and restoration were intensely debated topics. Petit was the leading opponent of the neo-Gothic of the time, and a pioneer of preserving old buildings against destructive restoration well before that became accepted.

He was also an Anglican clergyman, ordained deacon in 1825 and priest in 1826, both at Lichfield Cathedral. He served two curacies – the first from 1825 to 1828 at St. Michael's Lichfield and the second from 1828 to 1832 at Bradfield in Essex. He then retired from parish ministry to concentrate on his artistic and architectural interests. He remained a priest however, and was much interested in the theological developments of the mid-19th century – in particular the revelations of the earth and astronomical sciences. At his death he left a long unfinished poem *The Lesser and the Greater Light*. that was a meditation on the relationship between theology and science, which was edited and published by his sister. This poem has many contemporary echoes and reveals that Petit was a serious theological thinker.


The New Testament reading
